The Infinity Cookie Company Caper

What do you get when you combine a generous grant from Citizens Bank, some really smart Brown University graduate students, a forensic pathologist, and the creativity of a middle school science teacher? You got it! A break in at a cookie company and the resulting crime that needs to be solved!

"Science is everywhere! My goal is always to expose the students to as many interesting aspects of science as I can in hopes that they will appreciate both the mysteries of science as well as the broad range of career paths that science provides," said science teacher, Arthur Santoro. Mr. Santoro, a self-proclaimed science nerd, knows that





middle schoolers love hands-on learning, and so he tapped into a generous grant from Citizens Bank to buy an array of new lab equipment and materials including microscopes, slides, beakers, and new textbooks.

Students then began this crime unit with a study of the human cell, fingerprints, and fibers. This eventually led to an exploration of forensics and DNA. At that point, he brought in a group of graduate students from Brown University, as well as forensic pathologist, Dr. Lance Truong (shown left), to talk about and do science with his students. Under the guidance of the Brown volunteers, students executed a lab on the technique of gel electrophoresis, where students took samples of DNA and placed them in the wells of an agarose gel (shown above). *Continued Inside Top Left*




Grad Updates

This summer we will tackle the biggest project of all-converting the current library (see related article below) into a Technology and Robotics space. The co-location then of tech, robotics, science, and art on the third floor makes that level an incredible place, full of activity, inspiration, and learning. In addition to being great spaces for student learning, teachers will also have the opportunity to collaborate and develop engaging interdisciplinary curricula. These changes have no doubt created both efficiencies and opportunities, and would never have been possible without the support of donors to The Star Campaign.



FLY Initiative

This fall, SMS launched a partnership with the Financial Literacy Youth Initiative (FLY). Agents of Change

"They are the perfect age. They are discovering that the world is bigger than just their neighborhood, and they still have flexible thinking," said Roger Williams Park Zoo's School Program Specialist, Meg Archer, of students in the 7th grade. This year, San Miguel is partnering with the Zoo as part of its Environmental Justice Academy, Funded by a United Way Community Impact Grant, the program aims to teach youth that zoos are about more than just animals by providing two educators who partner with teachers and lead weekly discussions with the students. Topics range from environmental justice and conservation, to food deserts and health care access. They have also discussed issues related

to housing in urban areas, as well as what it means to be active in your community. Meg has been joined by independent contractor, AJ Burton, from Connecting for Children and Families. Both Meg and AJ (bottom left with Remington) are walking the walk of what they teach by both becoming mentors in our Adult Mentor program. "I've never felt more welcomed by a community than I have here," said Archer.

Students in the class have enjoyed learning about topics that they really had no previous knowledge of and have begun to think about putting their learning into action. Their homeroom teacher, David Cormier, elaborates, "The students are beginning to think about ways that they can impact their own environment, which is something few youths ever consider. They will choose their own issue to address. which is powerful in itself, and the Roger Williams Zoo staff will guide them through the process of determining how they can make their world a better place. This is a great way to teach our youth that they are more than just passive learners—they can be agents of change!"

Annual Awards Lunch

On December 2nd, after a three-year hiatus, the San Miguel community came together once again for our Winter Awards Luncheon. Faculty and staff, joined by families, mentors, and sponsors, gathered in the gymnasium to celebrate student achievements.
